LISA DOLOVICH, PHARMD, MSC, BSCPHM

Dr. Lisa Dolovich is a Professor and the Associate Chair, Research in the Department of Family Medicine at McMaster University. She is an Associate Member in the Departments of Clinical Epidemiology and Biostatistics and Medicine and a pharmacist and scientist with the Centre for Evaluation of Medicines at St Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton. She is affiliated with pharmacy schools at the University of Toronto and University of Waterloo.

Lisa co-leads the *Teams Advancing Patient Experience: Strengthening Quality* (or TAPESTRY) research program (healthtapestry.ca). TAPESTRY is a health and social care approach that centres on meeting a person's health goals with the support of technology, trained community volunteers, an interprofessional team, system navigation, and better links between primary care and community organizations.

Lisa also co-leads the Cardiovascular Health Awareness Program (chaprogram.ca) which was recognized as a CIHR-CMAJ Top Canadian Achievements in Health Research Award in 2013 and has been adapted for application by Emergency Medical Services (CHAP-EMS).

Between 2003-2007, Lisa co-led a large demonstration project examining pharmacist integration into family practice in Ontario (IMPACT; impactteam.info) and she is the AFHTO FHT liaison to the FHT pharmacist network providing networking support for the over 150 pharmacists working in Family Health Teams in Ontario.
